## Celebrating 70 years of Keetoowah Sovereignty

Tahlequah – The United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians will celebrate 70 years of Keetoowah sovereignty on October 3, 2020.

“What 70 years of sovereignty means to me is that we

have the right to govern ourselves,” said Chief Joe Bunch. “We’ve been here for centuries and today Congress and the world now recognize Native Americans as tribal nations. That’s what sovereignty is.”

The United States Congress officially recognized the UKB in 1946 under the terms of the Oklahoma Indian Welfare Act of 1936, but our constitution and bylaws would not be written and approved until October 3, 1950.

That day, the vote would be 1,414 in favor and one against.

The vote was to approve the UKB constitution and by-



## Health discrimination portal open

TAHLEQUAH – The United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians Tribal Council has partnered with Jeffrey Nelson Law Firm to launch an online healthcare discrimination portal for Keetoowahs who feel they have been denied healthcare at Cherokee Nation Healthcare Operations based upon their UKB membership affiliation.

The portal can be accessed by visiting [www.mctlaw.com/ukb-healthcare](http://www.mctlaw.com/ukb-healthcare). Submissions are strictly voluntary and will not be shared publicly.

“Council authorized the creation of an internet portal where UKB citizens can vol-

untarily share their stories if they believe they, or someone in their family, were treated differently by a Cherokee Nation healthcare employee or received substandard care because of their Keetoowah tribal membership,” said Nelson.

He noted that the U.S. government has a “unique legal relationship with Indian tribes, including the “duty to provide tribal citizens with healthcare.”

This commitment began with the creation of the Indian Health Service within the Department of Health and Human Services in 1955.

## UKB Gaming Compact takes effect

TAHLEQUAH - The United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians in Oklahoma are proud to announce that on September 8, 2020, the U.S. Government published notice in the Federal Register that the tribe’s Class III Gaming Compact with the State of Oklahoma has been deemed approved under the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act and is now effective.

This Compact will open a new chapter of Indian gaming for both the tribe and the State of Oklahoma.

For the State, the Compact marks a new era of possibilities with the Governor’s

recognition that he is authorized to deviate, within certain bounds, from the Oklahoma Model Compact and negotiate individualized Compacts with Oklahoma tribes.

The compact authorizes certain Class III casino gaming, not to include sports betting, at a Keetoowah casino to be developed in Logan County, Oklahoma. Revenue sharing with the State at this future facility will range from 12–15 percent, depending on the level of adjusted net revenue from the casino’s gaming machines.



laws as they had been submitted on May 8, 1950 to the Assistant Secretary of the Interior William E. Warne.

The seven-page document begins by reading: “We the members of the United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians in Oklahoma, in order to promote our common welfare and to secure to ourselves and our posterity the rights, powers and privileges authorized and offered by the Oklahoma Indian Welfare Act of June 26, 1936 and the Act of August 10, 1946, do hereby ordain and establish the following constitution and bylaws.”

The voting process, which required at least 30 percent of eligible tribal voters to cast their ballots, was overseen by then Chief Jim Pickup and Secretary White Runabout.

This historical vote is now celebrated each year on the first weekend in October with the Annual Keetoowah Celebration.

Unfortunately 2020 is the first year that the tribe and its members will not be coming together physically to hold Celebration, which marks the

event with a traditional meal, traditional games and an address from the chief.

Activities this year have been cancelled due to COVID-19 and the UKB Tribal Council hopes to reconvene for Celebration again in 2021.

Year 70 has been especially good to the Keetoowahs, including a decision by the U.S. Supreme Court to let our 76-acre land in trust decision stand after an appeal by the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma was filed in January 2020.

Our 76-acres in Tahlequah is home to our community services buildings, our childcare center, the John Hair Cultural Center and Museum, a wellness center, the Jim Proctor Elder and Nutrition Center and our stomp grounds.

The decision to honor our land in trust means that the Keetoowahs will have 76 acres to do with as we see fit into perpetuity, bringing real weight to our tribe’s saying of “Keetoowah Forever.”

Former UKB Chief Jim Henson, who served from 1998 to 2000, shared what 70 years of sovereignty means to him.

“For me personally, I would say 70 years of sovereignty means blessed,” he said. “Our Creator has been fighting for us, even when we have had disagreements or differences. Our Creator has always interceded for us. Today, it is an honorable blessed state to have our sovereignty recognized by having our land into trust.”

UKB Media Director Brittney Bennett also shared her thoughts on 70 years of sovereignty.

“It is remarkable to have a history that we can look back on and say that 70 years ago, our leaders knew how important it was to assert our sovereignty with the writing of a constitution and bylaws,” said Bennett.

“These principles and foundations of government allow us to make national and local decisions that we know are in our own best interest, give our people a bill of rights and allows us to hold our own elections. We are not a tribe that has been lost to time or colonization. We continue to endure with a federal recognition that cannot be undone. We Keetoowahs have truly been blessed by the Creator.”

## 70 Years of Being Keetoowah Strong!

Dear Tribal Members,  
Employees and Partners,

Siyo!  
At this time, local and rural schools have started, some with face-to-face instruction and others with virtual or distant learning. Please be alert for the school stops in the mornings and afternoons.

I wish everybody well.  
We have had six months of a tribal emergency due to the Coronavirus, or COVID-19 pandemic. Our prayers go out to those who are sick or have lost loved ones due to the virus.

When the Coronavirus first arrived six months ago, at first we thought in two weeks this will be over and we will be back to normal. Fast forward and it’s been 6 months and we are not back to normal.

No one knows when we will get through this, but we know we will get through this sickness. I know we are tired of saying this, but the impact of getting sick is lethal. I remind everyone to mask up, wash and sanitize your hands often, practice social distancing and distance from sick people.

In order to protect the public and employees our Tribal services work day is continue as scheduled. The departments are open Tuesday through Thursday

with our lobby closed to the public. The tag office has a modified schedule so please call ahead. The Jim Proctor Elder and Nutrition Center is closed, but you can get a grab and go lunch from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

We received good news! Our Class III Gaming Compact has taken effect. On September 8, 2020 we received notice in the Federal Register that the Office of Indian Gaming has approved our compact for tribal gaming in Logan County, which is north of Oklahoma City.

The process is first to find a location suitable for gaming, purchase the parcel, put the parcel in trust with the federal government, and develop the casino and employee base.

We now have the approval for gaming in Logan County due to our State Compact. We have one more major step to place that land into trust with the federal government.

We know there will be opposition against this casino development. However, this is an exciting time for the United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians, and we look forward to the development of a casino and a new relationship with the State of Oklahoma.

In a September 5, 2020 Council Meeting the Council approved the purchase of a property in Muskogee to house a satellite medical and behavioral health

clinic. The property has a little over two acres and existing medical equipment, provided the purchase is CARES Act eligible. We look forward to this development.

The Council also approved the tribe applying for a BIA 477 contract, which includes Higher Education, Adult Education and Johnson-O’Malley program funding.

On September 11, 2020 the Food Bank of Eastern Oklahoma delivered a mobile pantry, which provided vegetables for at least 125 families. The delivery was in bulk and volunteers assisted with the sorting and repackaging of the food for the nine district representatives to distribute in the nine districts.

Our next delivery is October 27, 2020. Your council representatives have the dates for further deliveries. I thank the volunteers and council for their service in making the delivery of vegetables a success.

In closing, I am sad we have cancelled the 70th Annual Celebration of the United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On October 3, 1950, the tribal members ratified our constitution and corporate charter, which is still in existence today.

This year marks 70 years of sovereignty and we are still going Keetoowah Strong. Thank the Lord for our many blessings!

In Loving Memory, Mark W. Raper

Editor's Note: Mark's passing occurred right after the last issue of our newspaper had already gone to print. His family has requested it make it to this issue, regardless of the time that has lapsed. We send our prayers to his family for their continued comfort amid his passing.

On Monday, February 10, 1958, Mark W Raper was born in Claremore, Oklahoma as the first-born son of Myrtle and Willie Raper.

Mark lived in Kenwood's Raper Holler most of his life until his sudden passing on Thursday, July 9, 2020 at the age of 62 years, 5 months, and 29 days.

Mark was the eldest brother to James, Emily, Esther, Eleanor, and Melody.

Early in his childhood, Mark grew up in Elgin, Illinois during the years Myrtle and Willie were stationed under the Bureau of Indian Affairs relocation program.

First-time mom Myrtle doted on her son, making sure he had playmates and plenty of pictures of a bow-tied little boy dressed for many staged photos. Returning to Kenwood from Illinois, Mark would share his years with his parents in their Raper

Holler home.

Mark attended Kenwood School and would later graduate from Salina High School in 1977.

He played defensive line-back and was named Senior Homecoming escort for the Wildcat Football team. Mark was an avid fan of the Wildcats and attended games with his brother, James, and friends, Andy and Andrew Hair.

Mark would later earn his Associates Degree in Electronics from Haskell Indian Nations University.

Mark worked in various positions throughout northeastern Oklahoma and Arkansas.

He remained close to home to care for his parents. Quiet and loving in nature, Mark was devoted to their care.

After the passing of his father in 2008, Mark was the sole care provider for his mother until her passing in 2014. He made sure she was cared for and at her constant side.

Mark loved his family and was especially fond of his great nephews and nieces. Mark would light up with a smile anytime they visited or when he learned they played sports or accomplished school goals. He was their Uncle Mark, a name he en-

joyed having.

He enjoyed keeping up with his OU Sooners and Minnesota Vikings. An avid sports fan, Mark favored watching sports on TV and traveling to car races with his brother James and close friends.

He was proud of his contributions as a fluent Cherokee speaker. Later in life, his health became a challenge in daily life.

Though disabled from working, he remained informed with the current events by reading the Tulsa World daily. It wasn't unusual to hear first-hand news from Mark.

He enjoyed the local newspapers and would often ask family to bring a paper when they visited him. Mark was well-known for his constant smile, kind nature, and gentle demeanor.

He always had a friendly smile and a kind "hello" when he greeted others. Mark may have been quiet in keeping to himself, but he did know the Lord.

He prayed and read his Bible. On a recent trip to an appointment, he and his sister were talking

about God when he said, "I pray. I pray because I know God hears me. He takes care of me."

The sister and Mark shared this special time together just weeks before he was called home. Mark is in glory with Jesus, his Lord and Savior.

# UKB sets COVID-19 hours through 2020

TAHLEQUAH - The United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians Offices have extended its current COVID-19 operating schedule of Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays only from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. through Dec. 31, 2020.

“This decision was made for both the safety of our tribal members and our staff due to continuing COVID-19 concerns,” said Brittney Bennett, UKB media director. “We will continue to be open on select days, though our lobby will continue to remain closed to the public for services. We encourage tribal members to visit our website at [www.ukb-nsn.gov](http://www.ukb-nsn.gov) if they need to download any applications. However, we do understand that this is not feasible for everyone. If you cannot go online, you can also get forms by visiting our front entrance on business days when weather permits, by reaching out to the department directly or by contacting your district representative.”

Tribal members seeking Keetoowah Tag Agency services will have three days to do so. Tuesdays will be for renewals via phone only by calling 918-871-2770. The office will need a copy of your insurance card in order to process a renewal via phone. You can scan and send a copy to any of the following emails: [gmauldin@ukb-nsn.gov](mailto:gmauldin@ukb-nsn.gov), [sbluebird@ukb-nsn.gov](mailto:sbluebird@ukb-nsn.gov), [jdick@ukb-nsn.gov](mailto:jdick@ukb-nsn.gov). There is a \$4 processing fee for payments by phone.

Wednesdays will be for appointments only. To schedule an appointment, tribal members must call 918-871-2770 no later than 2 p.m. the Tuesday before to obtain an appointment for Wednesday. Thursdays are for renewals by phone at 918-871-2770, as well as walk-ins with no appointment needed.

Tribal members must use the south patio of the Federal Programs Building and are encouraged to wear a mask. Keetoowah Tag Agency forms can also be downloaded at [www.ukb-nsn.gov/tag-agency](http://www.ukb-nsn.gov/tag-agency). The Henry Lee Doublehead CDC is operating Monday through Friday with normal hours from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. To read their COVID-19 protocols, visit [www.ukb-nsn.gov/henryleecd](http://www.ukb-nsn.gov/henryleecd). Title VI/Elder Nutrition will only be operating Monday through Thursday for drive-thru meals from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Keetoowah Transit Services will only be operating on Tuesdays and Thursdays through October 1. Beginning

October 6th, service will open up to three days a week on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

Hours of operation for Transit will be 8:30 a.m. and last call will be taken at 3:30 p.m. Transit will be closed for lunch from 12 p.m. to 1 p.m. Until further notice, Transit will only be operating within a ~5 mile radius of the city limits (Tahlequah and Stilwell). Riders will be required to wear a mask inside the Transit vehicles at all times. A maximum of 2 riders from the same household will be allowed in the transit vehicles at one time.

Historic Preservation and the Office of Environmental Services are open on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays by appointment only from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Please call 918-871-2825 to schedule an appointment for any needs.

The John Hair Cultural Center and Museum is only open for private tours that must be scheduled with Director Ernestine Berry. To schedule a tour, please call 918-871-2866.

The operating schedule will be re-assessed in mid-December and a new announcement made once operating hours for 2021 have been declared.

the casino’s gaming machines.

For the tribe, the compact will help reopen a gaming facility to generate much needed tribal revenue for governmental programs that will benefit approximately 14,000 Keetoowah members.

“As a former gaming regulator, I can appreciate the importance of a strong gaming code,” said Chief Joe Bunch. “This Class III Compact will take gaming and gaming regulation to a new level in Oklahoma.”

“We are very pleased with this federal approval,” said Jamie Thompson, Chairman of the UKB Corporate Board. “The UKB Corporate Board will now work with its developers to select a casino site in Logan County, as specified in the Compact.”

The tribe’s compact negotiators were handled by UKB Attorney General Klint



Cowan and Jeffrey Nelson, Assistant Attorney General.

As of press time, it was unclear if any recent Oklahoma court decisions would affect the compact.

UKB officials met with Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt on July 1 to sign a gaming compact that allows the tribe to conduct Class II and Class III gaming. ## Tribal Council sets aside funds for “microhospital”

TAHLEQUAH – The United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians Tribal Council voted Sept. 5 to set aside funds for a possible microhospital during its regular monthly meeting.

Councilors voted unanimously to set aside \$1.5 million from the CARES Act to be transferred to the UKB Corporate Board for the purpose of a “microhospital,” according to the language read by Secretary

Joyce Hawk during the meeting.

The funds would purchase both a potential location and an existing building. Further details were not discussed in the meeting, though Chief Bunch has indicated this location would be in Muskogee.

In other news, Councilors:

- Listened to Chief Bunch encourage Council to visit with tribal members to complete the Census;
- Voted to approve the meeting minutes for the month of August

2020;

- Approved to accept 4 new members and to honor 1 for tribal relinquishment from the United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians of Oklahoma Enrollment;
- Voted to table a transfer of funds to purchase heavy equipment in the amount of \$1.4 million from the CARES Act fund from the U.S. Treasury;
- Voted to approve authorizing submissions of a PL-638 contract proposed to Bureau of

Indian Education for the Higher Education Assistance Program for FY 2021;

- Voted to approve that the Tribe immediately pursue all BIA programs not currently compacted by UKB including all 477 funds;
- Voted down a resolution that would have created an ad hoc committee to update the UKB Business and Finance Regulatory Act of 2012;
- and voted to disapprove a virtual online Celebration.

# Council requires Corporate Board to produce quarterly financials

TAHLEQUAH – The United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians Tribal Council voted July 11 to require the UKB Corporate Board to produce quarterly financial statements to the tribe and agreed to move into Phase II of its forensic audit during its regular monthly meeting.

Tahlequah District Representative Jeff Wacoche proposed a resolution to “invoke the UKB Corporate Board to provide quarterly dividends to the United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians General Fund” as written in the UKB Corporate Board Act and stipulated that the tribe’s first payment is “due 7/13/20 by close of business.”

The UKB Corporate Board Act, Section B. Business Development Powers 5. (a)(b) states that “70 percent of annual Net Profits or dividends shall be retained by the UKB Federal Corporation for the continued development and growth of operations and maintenance of existing and new UKB Federal Corporation business undertakings...” The remaining 30 percent of net profits or dividends “shall be distributed by quarterly or annual dividend from the UKB

Federal Corporation to the United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians in Oklahoma General Fund for essential governmental functions and services pursuant to the General Fund Budget approved by the Tribal Council.”

“They’re supposed to be giving 30 percent of its profits to the tribe. They have not given any funds to the tribe since May of 2017,” said Wacoche.

The Corporate Board currently operates five businesses including Echota RV Park and Floats, Echota Behavioral Health, Keetoowah Cherokee Treatment Services, Superior Funding and KCI Construction LLC.

Assistant Chief and Corporate Board Chairman Jamie Thompson indicated the lack of annual reports was due to the Corporate Board’s financial status when he took position five years ago and that “at the end of July we will have three years of books that have been audited finally.”

UKB Attorney General Klint Cowan suggested changing the date of the first payment to the tribe to the end of a recent business quarter for the Corporate Board. Councilors agreed to change the resolution to make the first payment to the tribe due “within 30 days” of July 11.

Cooweescoowee District Representative Jeannie Tidwell gave Wacoche’s motion a second

and the resolution passed 7-5. Councilors Wacoche, Tidwell, Eddie Sacks, Frankie Still, Peggy Girty, Charles Smoke and Secretary Joyce Hawk voted in favor. Councilors Adalene Smith, Sharon Benoit, Barry Dotson, Thompson and Treasurer Ella Mae Worley voted against.

The tribe was also given a briefing from accounting firm Eide Bailly on Phase I of its audit of the tribe’s General Fund, Casino Fund and the Corporate Authority Board.

The General and Casino Funds were audited for the period between January 2012 and September 2014, while the Corporate Board was audited from February 2016 to July 2017.

“A lot of this is former casino money,” said Thompson. “There had never been an audit, a close out of the casino. We decided that we need to get an audit and we wanted to get a forensic audit.”

An Eide Bailly representative shared financials from each account as follows: General Fund accounted for \$43 million in deposits and \$43 million in disbursements; Gaming Operations accounted for \$31 million in deposits and \$32 million in disbursements; and Corporate Authority Board accounted for \$1.8 million in deposits and \$1.8 million in disbursements.

“Forensic accounting means we’re looking at past financial transactions for a specific purpose. In this case it’s to account for monies,” said the representative. “We documented over \$153 million in deposits and disbursements during the examination period. Right now, all we know is that we know that ‘x’ dollars went into these accounts. This doesn’t necessarily mean that all dollars that should have been deposited, were deposited.

“The next phase would include looking at supporting documentation to make sure that whatever should have been deposited also was deposited into the accounts. The same thing on the disbursement side... The question then becomes, were they leaving for appropriate purposes? That part would be Phase II.”

The representative shared the firm, while it did not have access to all accounts in Phase I such as payroll, is ready to begin Phase II and that it would take “two to three months.” Councilors agreed to let the firm proceed.

In other news, Treasurer Worley gave the tribe’s a financial report for the month of June, with \$114,007.99 in debts and \$28,000 in revenue; and Accounting firm Finley and Cook confirmed tribal members would not be taxed on the tribe’s issuance of COVID-19 checks.

# Council receives audit report, addresses Corporate Board

TAHLEQUAH – The United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians Tribal Council received a report regarding the UKB Corporate Board audit among other business during its regular monthly meeting.

Councilors first visited with Auditors Mike Green and Anne Cole to receive an audit report of the UKB Corporate Board’s financials spanning the years of 2017, 2018 and 2019.

“We did issue what’s considered a clean opinion on all three years,” said Green. “We do look for fraud as part of our procedures, but we don’t go in and look at every invoice that was issued. The procedures that we preformed, which were normal audit procedures for a government entity, we didn’t find anything that indicated fraud or embezzlement.”

Auditors also noted that funds listed under “Gaming” from the former Keetoowah Cherokee Casino were not included in the report.

“If you look at your prior year financials in 2016, where the Corporate Board was included but unaudited, they presented a number that represented the assets of the gaming, which was about \$2.4 million. We had to take those assets out of that table in that report to present the number that’s just for KCTS and Superior Funding,” said Cole. “No actual cash was moved, it was just an asset number that was

represented in a prior financial statement that was removed for this financial statement.”

Corporate Board Chairman Jamie Thompson said he was proud of the report’s findings.

“We’re very excited about this. I guess this is the first time in the history of our tribe that we’ve had financials to present to the tribe from the Corporate side. I’m very proud of the report. It’s a reflection of the Corporate Board members,” he said.

Councilors also listened to a presentation with Corporate Board Attorney Pansy Moore-Shrier regarding allegations in a police report made by Tahlequah District Representative Jeff Wacoche.

“I was informed a few weeks ago by the attorney general that a police report had been submitted by a council member and that was Councilman Jeff Wacoche. The report was basically based upon a claim of embezzlement, alleging that the Corporate Board had committed a crime,” Moore-Shrier said.

She addressed the allegation “that the Corporate Board took money that it wasn’t supposed to take.”

“The basis of that allegation is that the Corporate Board raised their stipend and Tribal Council is the authority that has the ability to raise the stipend and approve the stipend,” she said. “The Corporate Board discussed and voted to raise the pay to \$500 for two meetings per month because the second meeting was trying to be added so tribal council could conveniently attend the

meetings. They never paid themselves the money because it hasn’t been approved by tribal council.”

Moore-Shrier also stated that no one including Wacoche contacted the Corporate Board to determine if the stipends had been paid and that he “violated” the UKB Code of Ethics by filing a report listing embezzlement without following procedures.

Wacoche responded by stating his report did not list “embezzlement,” but “misconduct.”

“On July 11 we passed a resolution that they would provide all contracts, everything, and they still haven’t provided any information to us, so that right there is breaking the law,” he said. “You’re supposed to come to our meeting and let everybody know the truth right here.”

In a notice dated Aug. 18, Attorney General Klint Cowan confirmed he received “a referral of a Uniform Incident Report received by Lighthorse Police on June 25, 2020 from Tribal Councilman Jeff Wacoche.”

“After review of the information provided and discussion with relevant individuals, the Attorney General has concluded that there is no basis for the complaint and there will be no further action taken on the allegations,” wrote Cowan.

A Council resolution requiring the Corporate Board to provide quarterly dividends to the tribe for profit made on Corporate Board businesses has also not been applicable to date.

“On dividends, there haven’t been any yet to distribute, so there haven’t been any distri-

butions made to either the Corporate Board or Tribal Council,” said Moore-Shrier.

Also at the meeting, Cooweescoowee District Representative Jeannie Tidwell introduced a motion to “extend the COVID-19 relief assistance filing up to October 1, 2020 and to extend member exclusivity date to September 30, 2020.”

The checks would apply for exclusive Keetoowahs only that have yet to receive a check from the previous disbursement period.

- Councilors also:
- Unanimously approved a motion to “approve submitting facility license notices for two sites.” The notice would go to the NIGC (National Indian Gaming Commission) and apply to The River Brewhouse and the tribe’s 76-acre parcel of land in trust. “We have to give 120-days notice before we can start gaming and the 76-acre parcel is included there and then the brew pub,” said Jamie Thompson, assistant chief. “We can put about 120-125 there (Brewhouse) easy and 300 out here.”
  - Voted 5-4-2 to “approve to re-engage all stipends for committees, boards and commissions, but to exclude any elected official or council representative from receiving any stipend while serving.”
  - Unanimously voted to approve a budget for the UKB Tradition Keepers;
  - Unanimously approved the Election Board budget with the amount of \$72,465;
  - and unanimously approved the use of a UKB satellite office in Stilwell to assist tribal members with their needs amid COVID-19.

“In its early years, the Indian Health Service provided health-care to Native Americans only by direct service—in hospitals and clinics operated by federal government healthcare employees. Since the late 1970s, the Indian Health Service has been authorized by Congress to delegate its responsibilities by contract to certain Indian tribes, which the Indian Health Service then pays to provide at least the same level of health-

care that it was providing to the service population,” said Nelson. In 1993 the IHS began delegating its duties by contracting with CNO, who in turn were to administer healthcare services to any Native American in north-east Oklahoma including UKB members, according to Nelson. “Through this contractual relationship, the federal government has funneled large amounts of money to the Cherokee Nation over many years, expecting the

Cherokee Nation to step into the shoes of the Indian Health Service and fulfill the federal government’s duties toward all tribal citizens in the area, including the Keetoowah Cherokees,” said Nelson. At this time, a lawsuit is not active and the firm is only information gathering. “Council is not predicting the results of its inquiry and at this time, it has not authorized any action regarding

this subject, beyond information gathering.” Keetoowah members that believe they have experienced an instance of discrimination while receiving healthcare services at any CNO facility are again encouraged to visit the healthcare discrimination portal at [www.mctlaw.com/ukb-healthcare](http://www.mctlaw.com/ukb-healthcare). Judge issues “motion to stay” in impeachment proceedings

TAHLEQUAH – The United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians Tribal Court has issued an “order of stay” in the impeachment proceedings of Chief Joe Bunch until 14 days after the Nov. 2, 2020 Tribal Council Election. The order of stay issued Aug. 12, 2020, states the original five counts of impeachment and punishment of censure against Bunch will stand, but that an ex parte temporary injunction would remain in place to block additional impeachment remedies proposed by Council on June 6, 2020. “The court issued an injunction against the Council in favor of me due to its failure to recognize basic principles of law. I am confident that the council’s failure to follow the constitution, together with the fact that the original petition was fraudulent, will result in a reversal of the censure and a complete exoneration,” said Bunch. “The stay allows the members of our tribe to listen to the real facts and make their own decisions free of ulterior motivation from those who would greedily attempt to snatch personal benefit from our tribe.” Representing Council in Tribal Court is UKB Assistant Attorney General Jeffrey Nelson.

good outcome for the UKB as a tribe,” he said. “Even though everyone on Council felt very strongly about the impeachment and the appeal, the Tribe’s leaders agreed to put aside their differences and let Keetoowah citizens make this decision during the November election. In the meantime, Council can redirect its attention away from such internal disagreements and toward the many other things that advance Keetoowah interests.” Bunch was originally impeached on five counts during a hearing held Jan. 7, 2020. Under the definition of the UKB Impeachment Code, “impeachment” means: “A proceeding against a public officer before a body, instituted by a written accusation called ‘articles of impeachment.’” Remedies proposed at the time for Bunch included removal from office, but Council elected to only issue an official censure letter, or reprimand, before the meeting concluded in the early morning hours of Jan. 8. Bunch filed an appeal of the charges with the UKB Tribal Court and has continued to serve in his official capacity as chief of the UKB. However, on June 6, Sequoyah County District Representative Berry Dotson made a motion to approve an addendum to the impeachment remedies,

reading a letter that proposed several new items in addition to the censure. “If passed by council this addendum will become part of the official censure of Chief Joe Bunch, will take effect immediately and will be effective until the winner of the next election for chief is sworn into office or until Council rescinds this addendum, whichever is earlier,” Dotson read. “If this addendum is approved by Council, the additional remedies for impeachment shall be: The chief shall have no supervision authority over any employees. The chief shall have no CEO powers. The chief shall be removed as a signatory from the band’s bank account. The chief shall refrain from any travel on behalf of the UKB. If the chief violates any of these remedies, he shall resign effective immediately.” Bunch sought relief through the UKB Tribal Court after the additional remedies were added, upon which Judge Charles H. Tripp issued the ex parte temporary injunction. The Aug. 12 motion to stay states that “this matter is stayed until 14 days after the next scheduled election, which is set for the 2nd day of November, 2020, subject to the Court’s determination of this matter after the stay is lifted by operation of law.”

Since 2005, the John Hair Cultural Center and Museum has awarded the prestigious title of “Tradition Keeper” to exclusive tribal members with traditional talents involving the Keetoowah language, arts and culture. These individuals are unselfish with their talents and have devoted themselves to passing on their knowledge to the next generation.

Adair was nominated for the honor for her storytelling abilities, which she says go beyond simply reciting a story from memory. “I don’t think people understand, it’s different than just hearing a story and remembering it and reciting it. A storyteller is different,” she said. “It’s a performance. You take people somewhere else. I know if an audience is with me because they’ll be transported somewhere else and as the story ends, you see them wake up. You feel it. It’s really powerful to see that happen.” Her specialty is sharing Cherokee Creation Stories with her audiences. “Through storytelling

I’m able to share my culture, the Keetoowah culture and the way that I grew up,” she said. “My stories are mostly about animals or how come something came to be the way that it is. Maybe something in the sky or on the earth or an animal and there’s always these moral stories that go along at the end of them. There’s always some kind of a lesson about how you should be with each other and how you treat one another.” Livers was nominated for his ability to speak the Cherokee language, an especially invaluable asset to the tribe when considering his work in Health and Human Services. HHS Director Jennifer

Cole-Robinson praised Livers for his abilities. “I am honored to have our newest Tradition Keeper as a Human Services advocate,” she said. “Ronny’s ability to communicate with our Elders and 1st Language Keetoowahs is invaluable to our Tribe and Human Services. His ability to talk to and understand the needs of our members in our native language ensures all their needs are met and they are comfortable in seeking assistance.” Tradition Keepers are normally honored during the tribe’s annual Celebration festivities during the first weekend of October. Due to COVID-19 concerns, this year’s Tradition Keepers will be honored at a later date.

TAHLEQUAH – The United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians rallied together its Enrollment department, the Child Care and Development Fund Program and the Henry Lee Doublehead Child Development Center to help exclusive Keetoowah children ages 4 to 18 with back to school supplies.

The Back to School Distribution was held on select

dates in August.

CCDF and Henry Lee CDC served children 4-12 years old by issuing 122 checks for \$300 each for the purpose of purchasing school clothing, school supplies and personal protective equipment (PPE). The programs also issued 132 iPads to aid in distance learning for children 4 to 12-years-old living within UKB’s jurisdictional boundaries.

Both programs also distributed various other supplies to students regardless of

jurisdictional boundaries including 135 backpacks for 4 to 12-year-olds and 130 backpacks for children 13 to 18 years old. Also distributed were 223 youth face masks, 436 adult masks and 152 fanny packs featuring the UKB logo.

“The iPads provided are to help our UKB children safely continue their education while social distancing. The facemasks, backpacks and additional money provided this year was to help our UKB families with purchasing extra supplies needed for UKB students who are distance learning or may have needed additional supplies for in-class learning,” said Christie Kirk, UKB Childcare director.

For children 13 to 18-years-old who lived outside UKB jurisdictional boundaries, UKB Enrollment issued 120 checks for \$300 each for the purpose of purchasing school clothing, school supplies and personal protective equipment (PPE).

The larger monetary and supply distribution this year was made possible with departmental funds and CARES Act funding from

the U.S. government due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

“This distribution was especially important this year because a lot of our UKB children and families have been directly impacted and continue to be impacted by COVID-19,” said Kirk.

UKB Registrar Amanda Stopp handled distribution for Enrollment and highlighted the continued importance of the event.

“It is important to assist our UKB tribal youth because they are the future of our tribe,” she said.

The Education Department will be giving laptops to exclusive Keetoowah students 13-18 years old to aid in distance learning amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

Students 12 and under who received a tablet through



UKB CCDF will not be eligible for this program. Students over 18 years old who need a laptop are encouraged to apply for a UKB Distance Learning Grant.

Exclusive Keetoowah students can apply for a Distance Learning Grant to help pay for college and vocational classes, as well as supplies.

Part-time college students

will receive \$2,500, while full-time students are eligible for \$5,000 in assistance.

Adults who wish to seek their education in a vocational program have the opportunity to receive up to \$5,000 in funds to complete a program.

To apply, students must visit [www.ukb-nsn.gov/education](http://www.ukb-nsn.gov/education) to fill out the appropriate

education assistance application and W-9 form. Additional documentation such as school verification is also required. A full list of those requirements appears on the application itself.

Students can turn in applications to the UKB Education Building in Tahlequah on Tuesdays, Wednesdays or Thursdays from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Internet Payment Assistance approved for students

TAHLEQUAH - The UKB Education Department has approved an Internet Payment Assistance Program for households with exclusive Keetoowah children whose school district has moved to attendance via distance learning during the COVID-19 pandemic.

“This is a new, developing program and will be modified as needed. Our children’s educational needs are a priority and Human Services will work diligently to ensure each application is processed and assistance provided quickly,” said

Jennifer Cole-Robinson, Human Services director.

There are no income guidelines for the program, though students must be exclusive Keetoowahs that live in the nine-district UKB service area.

For families that currently have internet access, UKB Education will provide payment for their internet bill until December 2020.

If the family currently has internet and cable bundled through a service provider, a detailed bill showing the cost of internet only will need to be provided

for payment. The tribe will not cover cable costs.

If the home does not currently have internet access, UKB Education will pay for internet installation and the bill until December 2020.

If the family lives in an area where no internet service providers are available, UKB Education will provide families with a hotspot and pay for hotspot internet refills until December 2020.

Families will be responsible for submitting the internet bill monthly and before due date for

prompt payment.

Applications will be available and processed through UKB Human Services. To obtain an application, contact the UKB mainline at 918-871-2800 and ask for Human Services or send an email to [twolfe@ukb-nsn.gov](mailto:twolfe@ukb-nsn.gov).

Families must provide documentation of the school district in which the child is enrolled in distance learning for program approval.

Payment assistance will end in December 2020 unless Congress extends the CARES Act Funding deadline.

# Duncan voices Kveliwohi on Cherokee animated series Inage'i

TAHLEQUAH – United Keetoowah Band member Schon Duncan went through the audition purely out of emotional support for his friend. He had no idea it would actually lead him to voicing one of the four main characters on the new animated Cherokee series “Inage'i”.

“When I went, I wasn't planning on auditioning,” he said. “I was just the driver for one of my friends who was looking into it. Once we got there, he decided it was not something he was interested in, but I was sure he should. Two fluent speakers, David Crawler and Anna Sixkiller, pushed me to audition myself and I told them I would do it just to show my friend how easy it was. A couple of months later, I got a call asking if I would voice a character. And of course, I accepted.”

Inage'i, which translates to “In The Woods” follows the adventures of four animal friends that reside in the forests of Turtle Island.

The animals are based on teachings from traditional Cherokee storytelling. Daya'i is the mischievous rabbit, Juksvsgi is the gruff wolf, Anawegi is the conscientious deer and Kveliwohi is the wise bear.

Duncan voices Kveliwohi.

“Kveliwohi is a bear that lives in a place called Huckleberry Hollow. My favorite thing about him so far is that he always seems to be needing a nap and that's a feeling I really identify with,” jokes Duncan. “He makes his home in a giant mound and is joined by three friends. He also has four medicine roots that help him help others when they aren't causing trouble with their own hijinx. But he also seems to be very compassionate with the other characters and wants the best for them. He gives into their curiosity but teaches them how to learn things in a safe way, whether it's about themselves or the world around them. I think people should expect him to be a very stable, caring and consistent character, but that doesn't always mean he's right and that doesn't mean he too isn't also

still learning.”

The animated series is a collaboration between the Cherokee Nation, the Oklahoma Film + Music Office and FireThief Productions. It is funded by the Cherokee Nation's Durbin Feeling Language Preservation Act and marks some of the first efforts to truly bring the Cherokee language through a mainstream medium, according to Duncan.

“This project is the first time that a group of people have set out to compete with today's top English cartoons with the Cherokee language,” said Duncan. “There are many kids, who

Boys Home in 2017 that he started seeking out more of the Cherokee culture.

“In 2017, I was working at the Tulsa Boys Home and realized how many native kids needed their culture to really cope with the traumas of the world. So I was seeking my own culture in the same way to help them. I was made aware of the Cherokee Language Master-Apprentice Program where I applied and was accepted,” he said. “Throughout those two years I was taught by and built relationships with very patient fluent speakers such as Jerry Ross, Doris Shell, Gary

first-language speakers, would be there to help me say the words when I started stuttering. I rehearsed every day up until recording. Harry and Betty were really great about being available to me and Lauren (Hummingbird) via Zoom for practicing our lines. I wanted to make sure that I could get the tones and the flow of the language right, while also acting. This was actually really great for my language learning and I'm really grateful to them for it.”

The pilot episode of Inage'i premiered on Sept. 4.

“I think the most exciting part was seeing other people enjoy it,” said Duncan. “My mother brought my sisters to watch it and seeing them be enthralled into something that was fully in Cherokee was moving. It was something I always wanted when I was younger and now I get to be a small part of bringing what was missing for me to a new generation and hopefully generations to come. I have heard nothing but excitement and support from my friends and family.”

Duncan is also the Cherokee language officer at Dahlenogah Public Schools and will be using the series as a way to teach in his classroom.

“I'm excited to use this project in my classroom to teach Cherokee. The Cherokee speakers have been nothing but supportive and without them I wouldn't be doing anything that I'm doing today. I'm sure, as always, they can see ways I can improve my language and I'm always open to hearing about that.”

Duncan said three more episodes of the series have been approved and are in the works.

“There is so much to this world to explore and I want to see it all, in our language and on the screen. There is such an opportunity for not only storytelling, but to engage the next generation of language warriors,” he said. “I do this work to do my part to save our language and I hope it inspires people in our tribes to do the same. If we idly sit by and let our language go, we will lose the cornerstone of our culture and what sets us apart from the rest of the world. It is going to take every single one of us. I'm thankful for every fluent speaker who has put time, work and words into me. I hope to see our tribes and our communities rise up together to do the real work of language revitalization and assert pride in our tongue and culture.”

learn the language through an immersion school or through public school systems that largely never get to see their language in today's top tier media landscape. The team behind this series specifically set out to create something that would be representative of Cherokee storytelling, culture and most importantly, Cherokee language. It's significant because it carves out a place for our language in place that has never made room for it and would rather see it extinct. Hopefully, it's the first of many to come.”

Duncan was not taught much of the Cherokee language growing up, though both of his grandfathers were speakers. He learned from teachers including Florence Sanders, Joanne Watie and Jim Carrey, but it wasn't until Duncan was working at the Tulsa

Vann, Cora Flute and Phyllis Sixkiller. I graduated in December of 2019 and stayed on as an intern for another six-months to help with curriculum building and rounding out my own language.”

Duncan said coming into the project as a second-language speaker was intimidating, but credits his fellow voice actors Harry Oosahwee and Betty Frogg for giving him confidence.

“I don't think a second-language learner ever feels ready for anything like this. There is always the tingling feeling of imposter syndrome in the back of your head. I think I felt a sense of nervousness and vulnerability, but also a sense of duty to the speakers who have put so much time and effort into my language journey,” he said. “I was relieved to see that Harry and Betty,



# UKB ICW opens first Keetoowah-certified foster home

TAHLEQUAH – The Indian Child Welfare Department at the United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians reached a milestone in July 2020, certifying its first ever Keetoowah foster home with Robyn and Andrew Taylor at the McIntosh Home.

“They contacted me around February and asked if we could take a pair of their girls and we had openings, so it started a long process of trying to get us certified with the Keetoowahs,” said Robyn. “As far as I know we are the only triply-certified foster home in Oklahoma.”

The department said the certification process took six months and is a critical step forward in their work.

“We can be involved from the very beginning of their case until we can get them reunited with their families,” said Roxana Wilden, UKB ICW director. “There is no uncertainty and the Keetoowah child knows that we are there immediately to take care of them and look out for their best interests.”

ICW Specialist Caleb Grimmett agrees.

“A foster home is one of the most key aspects of us being able to take on cases

within our tribal court system,” he said. “If we take full custody of a child, we’re fully responsible for them. We have to provide for that child, every need, and so a foster home is so important for our tribe because it allows us to start taking full custody. Our job as ICW is mainly to reunify the child with the parents. That’s our goal, but if we can’t prevent removal, we need a place for them to go. We’re thankful to the Taylors that they understand that.”

The Taylors are the foster parents of the McIntosh Home, the centerpiece of the McIntosh Home Foundation, a 501(c)(3) non-profit created by Mrs. Davetta McIntosh. She donated the home in 2018 as a safe home for children in foster care.

When UKB ICW faced an emergency situation with two Keetoowah children being removed in February, the Taylors were there to answer the call.

“I think when we got those girls and they said we were going to have to move them from their home, we started praying,” said Wilden. “We were so worried, asking each other what we were going to do, but then Caleb called the Taylors and everything just started falling into place, so that’s when we knew that this was where we were being led.”

Robyn and Andrew are no strangers to fostering after starting three years ago, first as kinship

parents and then as foster parents for the McIntosh home.

“We’ve had 21 fosters since we started our foster journey,” said Robyn. “We really saw the need and having a strong marriage and a strong relationship, we just felt like that was something we could offer. These kids just need love. They don’t need you to be a perfect parent.”

The process has not been easy, but it has been rewarding.

“You could tell when the girls walked through the door they did not want to be here and were angry. Now when you talk to them, it’s a total different attitude. There are still issues and they’re still teenage kids with personalities, but their whole demeanor has just completely changed,” said Robyn. “We firmly believe that every kid deserves a chance. Especially if you look at their history because we only take older kids, they all have a bad history. They just need love and consistency. It’s something we’ve discovered that none of them have ever had.”

As foster parents, both Robyn and Andrew are aware of the reasons why some choose not to foster, but encourage anyone interested to “get attached.”

“A lot of the times the excuses you hear are, ‘I would get too attached.’ These kids didn’t ask for this. If we’re not loving them and taking care of them,

who will? It’s the call that we feel God has put on our lives right now,” said Robyn. “I would say to anybody that’s thinking about it, ‘Get attached. Form a relationship and see what happens.’ Even if we have kids that go home, we still have relationships with them and that’s the best thing for them, to be able to go back to a healthy environment with their birth parents.”

Fostering older children also has its own rewards.

“A lot of the older kids have been on their own in so many ways that they don’t realize they don’t have to be mom anymore or they don’t have to be dad anymore. You can be yourself. You can grow up and do what you want to do. I think it’s more rewarding to see an older child make some more mature decisions versus a little one,” said Andrew.

The certification experience has also made UKB ICW and the Taylors their own type of family.

“We’ve had some bumps along this journey so far, but they’ve just stuck with us and it’s created a bond that’s like family between us and the Taylors,” said Grimmett. “A lot of people want to put fostering an older child aside because they just think there’s no hope for them. The Taylors believe in chances and it just takes a different type of environment to show that things aren’t always bad. They’ve proven it to our girls. They came in here angry and within a month or two, they were totally different girls. The Taylors are very special people are in a calling that I really am grateful for.”

# Echota Behavioral Health open to the public

TAHLEQUAH – Keetoowahs and members of the public can now access behavioral health resources and counseling services with the opening of Echota Behavioral Health, the UKB Corporate Board’s latest business venture.

“We were fortunate to get a grant on April 20, 2020 called Enduring Change, which has allowed us to open and to fully staff Echota Behavioral Health with licensed therapists, support staff and a case manager” said Director Jimmie Fite. “This also gave us the opportunity to reach out to everyone and help all the community.”

Echota Behavioral Health offers services for individuals throughout Northeastern Oklahoma that suffer from conditions including anxiety, depression, bipolar disorder, ADHD and ADD.

“We follow the crisis guidelines, which define the problem, ensure client safety with suicide risk assessment, provide support, examine alternatives, make plans and obtain commitment, or a safety plan,” said Fite.

Services can be received both in person and virtually due to COVID-19.

“We offer telehealth and in person sessions,” said Fite. “If the client opts to be seen in person we have in place precautions that help prevent the spread (of COVID-19). We have a sign at the entrance to ask anyone with symptoms to not enter the building, we ask for social distancing and temperatures will be taken at check-in. We also sanitize after each session.”

Echota Behavioral Health is also offering several tips for those struggling with mental health amid COVID-19.

“Maintaining a healthy

body and mind may seem challenging right now, but we’ve got tips to help,” states the website. “Eat healthy. Get moving. Sleep soundly.”

Individuals are also encouraged to use technology to stay connected to friends and loved ones amid COVID-19.

Expecting uncertainty and making room for your feelings are also listed as important factors for good mental health.

“It can be easy to grow anxious when you don’t have all the answers to what’s happening. Accepting that you may not be sure of what comes next during COVID-19 may lower your stress,” states the website. “While you can lower your anxieties, recognize that having these feelings is a part of being human. When you feel yourself getting anxious, reach out to others to describe what you’re going through. Avoid using drugs or

alcohol to cope with emotions. Those substances can make issues worse, not better.”

Services will also be discussed on an upcoming podcast series in the coming months.

Fite said Echota Behavioral Health is hoping the series will also be helpful in lessening the stigma around mental health.

“Mental health does have a stigma, but with good community outreach and ensuring confidentiality to all our clients, the stigma seems to lesson and that is what good therapy is all about,” she said.

Echota Behavioral Health is open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and closed Saturdays and Sundays. Emergency services are 24/7. Call 918-939-9694 for the crisis hotline.

This year all four officer positions and all nine district representative seats are up for election.

To be eligible to vote, Keetoowahs must be 21 or older by the Nov. 2 election day, have been an exclusive Keetoowah member for at least six months, be a resident or affiliated with a particular district and be listed in the official Voter List in the district of which the member wishes to vote.

A final voter list by district is listed on the next page.

They must also present their Keetoowah ID on the day of the election to verify identity.

Sequoyah District voters will need to report to the Sallisaw Nutrition Center at 115 W. Redwood in Sallisaw.


Tahlequah District voters will need to report to the UKB Wellness Center located at 18529 W. Keetoowah Circle in Tahlequah.

TAHLEQUAH - The United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians Election Board has completed background checks and approved 31 candidates to run for office during the Nov. 2, 2020 UKB Tribal Council Election.

This year all four officer positions and all nine district representative seats are up for election.

Due to a request by the UKB Election Board, the following candidates will be listed in this story in the order they appear on the November tribal ballot.

Candidates for Chief are as follows: Anile Adair Locust, Joe Bunch, Woodrow Woody Proctor, Roxana Wilden and Donald Adair.

Candidates for Assistant Chief are as follows: Jeff Wacoche, Jimmy Ray Thirsty Sr. (Buggy) and Jamie Thompson.

Candidates for

Secretary are as follows: Ronny R. Livers, Teresa Hair, Joyce Hawk and Charlotte Kingfisher Wolfe.

Candidates for Treasurer are as follows: James Wahoo Walters, Sonja Ummerteskee Gourd and Marlene Ballard. The winner will replace outgoing Treasurer Ella Mae Worley.

All candidates for officer positions will appear on the ballots in each district. Voters will make selections for each category in addition to voting for their individual district representative.

In the Canadian District, Incumbent Eddie Sacks drew no challengers and will be sworn in during the regularly scheduled tribal council meeting to be held the first Saturday in January 2021. Voters will still need to report to the Warner Senior Citizens Center located at 802 3rd Avenue in Warner to vote on officer positions.

In the Cooweescoowee

District, Incumbent Jeannie Tidwell will face off against challenger Clifford Wofford. Cooweescoowee District voters will need to report to Emmanuel Baptist Church located at 828 S. Muskogee Avenue in Claremore.

In the Delaware District, Caleb Grimmett will face off against Archie Buzzard to replace outgoing Representative Adalene Smith. Delaware District voters will need to report to the Jay Senior Citizens Center located at 816 S. Main in Jay.

In the Flint District, Incumbent Frankie Still drew no challengers and will be sworn in during the regularly scheduled tribal council meeting to be held the first Saturday in January 2021. Voters will still need to report to the Stilwell Community Building located at 320 N. 6th Street in Stilwell to vote on officer positions.

In the Goingsnake District, Incumbent Sharon Benoit will face off against challenger William Christie. Goingsnake District voters will have two sites for voting. Voters can visit Oaks City Hall at 128 E. Sequoyah Dr. in Oaks or Maryetta Public School at 470819 E. 810 Rd. in Stilwell.

In the Illinois District, challenger Leroy Hicks will face Incumbent Peggy Girty. Illinois District voters will need to report to the Cookson Hills Center located at 32087 Highway 82 S. in Cookson.

In the Saline District, Incumbent Charles Smoke drew no challengers and will be sworn in during the regularly scheduled tribal council meeting to be held the first Saturday in January 2021. Voters will still need to report to New Jordan Church located at N. 4428 Kenwood Rd. near Salina to

vote on officer positions.

In the Sequoyah District, Maudeen Vann, Junior L. Catron and Joey Duvall will face off to replace outgoing Representative Barry Dotson. Sequoyah District voters will need to report to the Sallisaw Nutrition Center at 115 W. Redwood in Sallisaw.

In the Tahlequah District, Alvin Hicks and Sammy Allen will face off to replace outgoing Representative Jeff Wacoche. Tahlequah District voters will need to report to the UKB Wellness Center located on the UKB tribal grounds at 18529 W. Keetoowah Circle in Tahlequah.

To be eligible to vote, Keetoowahs must be 21 or older by the Nov. 2 election day, have been an exclusive Keetoowah member for at least six months, be a resident or affiliated with a particular district and be listed in the official Voter List in the district of which the member wishes to vote.

They must also present their Keetoowah ID on the day of the election to verify identity.

According to the Keetoowah Election Ordinance, an eligible voter residing in the territory known as the “Old Cherokee Nation” will be allowed to vote in the district in which they have resided for a period of three months prior to the election.

If the Keetoowah has changed residences in the three months prior to voting, they will “not be entitled to vote in the new district” until the next election.

Instead, voters must vote in the old district of which their name appears on the Voters List.

No absentee voting shall be permitted. For voters with physical disabilities, precinct workers will be on hand at each polling place to assist with the voting process.
